



Learning in EYFS: What History Subject Leaders Need to Know

The EYFS framework is organised across seven areas of learning. The aim of this document is to help subject leaders to understand how the skills taught across EYFS feed into national curriculum subjects.

This document demonstrates which statements from the 2020 Development Matters are prerequisite skills for history within the national curriculum. The table below outlines the most relevant statements taken from the Early Learning Goals in the EYFS statutory framework and the Development Matters age ranges for Three and Four-Year-Olds and Reception to match the programme of study for history.

The most relevant statements for history are taken from the following area of learning:

- Understanding the World

Understanding the world is broken down into three areas – the most relevant of these being Past and Present

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Reception	<p>Children will learn about Remembrance Day in more detail and will consider how the world has changed for some of the older people in their lives, such as grandparents. Children will be able to discuss how their grandparents' lives were different to theirs.</p> <p>Children will learn about castles in the local area and compare how some of them look now with what they would have looked like in the past.</p> <p>We will look at seasonal changes and discover how the current season is similar or different to one in the past.</p>	<p>Children will learn more about the history of Bonfire Night and how to stay safe, spending some time learning about this in the forest.</p> <p>Children will look at human life cycles and consider how they have changed and will change in the future.</p>	<p>Children will know that dinosaurs lived a very long time ago, before us. They will be able to talk about some features of their environment and how the dinosaurs lived.</p> <p>Children will look at St Valentine and discover why he was an important Saint.</p> <p>We will look at seasonal changes and discover how the current season is similar or different to one in the past.</p> <p>Children will look at and create their own versions of art by Dave Follows.</p>	<p>We will learn about Where The Wild Things Are by Maurice Sendak in an historical context and learn about Stoke now and then.</p> <p>We will look at how climate change has had an impact on the real wild beasts in the world and what we can do to help them.</p>	<p>Children will know that Pirates lived a long time ago. They will learn about famous female pirates from history and about their lives and how they lived. Comparing their lives then with ours now.</p> <p>We will look at seasonal changes and discover how the current season is similar or different to one in the past.</p>	<p>We will look at the career of Stanley Matthews and consider how he became a Legendary sportsman and what it takes for us to follow our dreams. The children will discover how they can become involved in local sports.</p>
