Children listen and respond to different music styles, are introduced to the interrelated dimensions of music, sing along to nursery rhymes and action songs, playing instruments & performing.



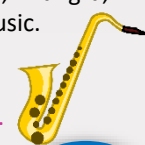

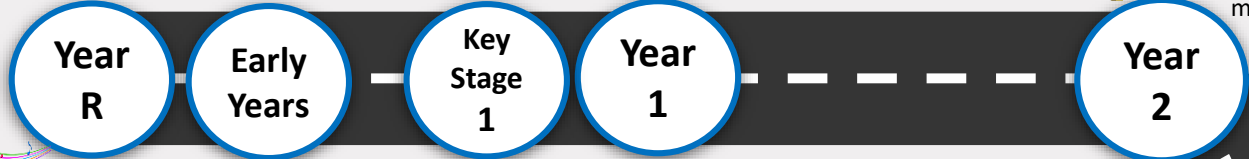


Playing instruments
 Both untuned and tuned instruments are introduced in EYFS whilst glockenspiel tuition is consolidated throughout KS1 & KS2. Further opportunities to learn other instruments (e.g. ukulele) is offered in after school clubs.

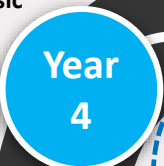

Musical strands of learning
 The interrelated dimensions of music weave through all curriculum units from EYFS to Y6 to encourage the development of musical skills. Child attainment progresses through unit structured strands of learning: listening & appraising, musical games & activities (including creating and exploring) & performance.
