They are the first school in our collegiate to have such an inspection. St Peter's has been graded as outstanding in all areas. This is a great tribute to the amazing work that is taking place in the school and the tremendous support of the children and families. As with all schools across the collegiate, Jesus is at the centre of all that they do and we all know we are all, 'Growing together for life.'

I must also congratulate St Wilfrid's who retained their Good status in their latest Ofsted inspection. The inspector was very complementary about the school and can see that the school is moving swiftly to becoming outstanding. It was moving to hear the many positive comments from parents, and it was lovely to hear that, "Leaders have high aspirations for all pupils at St Wilfrid's. The school motto, 'love one another as I have loved you', is at the heart of leaders' work."

Congratulations to Our Lady and St Benedict's who were graded good at CSI. We now look forward to welcoming Ofsted so we can show all the great work that takes place at this school.

It was also great to see the children at St John's finally move into their new school. Many years of planning have finally been realised. This has given the school state of the art facilities that will serve the Catholic community in Kidsgrove,



for years to come. We have also had success at St George and St Martin by securing over £265,000 pounds to create a new playground. We are delighted that we continue to develop our facilities to ensure our children have the very best. Thank you to all for supporting our next project to build a new chapel at St Margaret Ward. Once built this will be at the heart of our collegiate and a place that all will discover more about God.

I am most proud of the wonderful transition work that we have been doing. This year St Margaret Ward has been oversubscribed with first choice applications meaning that, some children, who put St Margaret Ward down as their first choice, have not been allocated a place. I am pleased that all collegiate children that put St Margaret Ward as their first choice and applied on time, have secured their place in Year 7 for September. I am keen to stress the importance of putting St Margaret Ward down as first choice if you wish for your child to continue their outstanding education in the collegiate. The popularity of the school will mean it is becoming more difficult to get in. To support our collegiate families, next year we are trialling a minibus service that means all year 7 children have the option of getting on a minibus from one of our feeder primary schools to travel to St Margaret Ward. If this proves popular, we hope to increase the capacity to all year groups.

Thank you to the vast majority of parents for their support in ensuring that pupils attend school on time and regularly. We have seen an improvement in attendance in all our schools. Special mention to St Margaret Ward who have received an accolade from the DfE for having attendance in the top 25% of similar school nationally. Please continue to ensure that pupils attend school regularly and on time.

This half term I had the privilege of leading an assembly in all our Primary schools. Each school has worked with Mr Corrigan, our senior lay chaplain to produce our collegiate prayer. This prayer can be seen on display in all our schools.

I should like to pass on my sincere thanks to all Directors and Governors across the collegiate. We are blessed to have such committed volunteers who set the vision and values of our collegiate and schools. Special thanks to both Mrs Gill Hodgkinson and Mr Simon Edge. Both have served as Chairs of Governors at St Joseph's, St Mary's and Our Lady of Grace for a number of years. Both have been real servants of our communities and supported their schools to succeed. I wish them well as they retire from


their roles as Governors.

OLSB Year 4 class got the chance to travel on a train, a tram and to visit the Lowry Gallery in Manchester.

It was an early start, departing from Stoke station where they were met by a chaperone. The children were so excited to start their adventure and to travel on a train - many of the children have never been on a train before.

As they got closer to Manchester the children were amazed to see a famous football stadium from the train windows.

Leaving the train at Manchester Piccadilly they boarded the Metro link tram. The children found it amusing that the tram ran through the middle of the city past cars and people shopping. They were immersed in the busy hustle and bustle in the city and noticed the tall Deansgate tower which is an actual skyscraper!

The children arrived at Salford Quays a unique waterfront location adjacent to Media City UK, home to the BBC and ITV. The children couldn't believe it was where the news and some of their television programmes were filmed and produced. It is also the home to the Lowry Arts Centre.

Once inside the Centre the children attended a workshop delivered by a professional artist to further explore the work of L S Lowry. During the workshop the artist took the children into the galleries to see the artworks and then they had the opportunity to create a response to what they



had seen. The theme was around the industrial scenes, landscapes and portraits within LS Lowry's work. The children explored perspective, proportions and creative responses.

As it was a sunny day, they ate lunch outside, and had a chance to explore the Manchester Ship Canal and the historic site of the Manchester Docks where they saw canal barges and some ducks!

As the day came to an end, it was back to Manchester Piccadilly station to board the train for the return journey home.

This was all funded and made possible via Avanti Trains and their Feel Good Field Trip programme. It was a fantastic opportunity for the children allowing them to experience a real train and tram journey, to visit an art gallery and see the world beyond their own home location. They have returned to school full of enthusiasm and have

not stopped taking about the 'best day ever!' We'd like to express our gratitude to Avanti Trains and thank them for the fantastic opportunity that they provided for the children.

This is just one of a whole host of trips and enrichment activities provided for the children at OLSB. They try to provide the children with as many opportunities as possible to build cultural capital and to see and experience life beyond the local area of Abbey Hulton.

ST MARGARET WARD TAKE PART IN FIRST TECH CHALLENGE WEST MIDLANDS

In March 2023, St Margaret Ward's brand new 'First Tech Challenge' team attended RAF Cosford for the West Midlands Regional Tournament.

Together they built a robot, but more importantly they built a diverse community of friends across years 7 to 11. At the event they made the semifinals and were runners up for the Motivate Award. Half of the awards at the event were enthusiastically presented by volunteers from St Margaret Ward, and the group were publicly commended from the very start of the event for their enthusiasm and engagement.

Since then, the group found out that they have made it to the First Tech Challenge National Championship at the University of Cambridge and the school has applied for and been given the award of joint 'FIRST Champion Organisation' for the West Midlands. Together, the school and the team will be promoting a love of STEM across not just the school but also their feeder schools and the wider community within Stoke-on-Trent. They expect to host First Tech Challenge competitions at the school in the new school year and are excited to support new teams in beginning their journey into the competition.

The team, rebranded as 'VNATION', have been hard at work every day preparing for the national competition on 23rd June. The mottos of the competition are 'More than Robots' and 'Gracious Professionalism', which the group have truly embraced. They have communicated with teams across the country to share advice with them, have held Teams meetings with technology companies to practice their interview, wrote letters to companies within Stoke-on-Trent and have attended enrichment sessions to support teachers and younger students. They have also begun to run their very own STEM sessions for the primary feeder schools, beginning with St Wilfrid's on 14th June. Together the group planned and created resources for two robotics sessions and delivered these to Year 5 without any adult input.

They have also written to FIRST to volunteer to be student ambassadors to VIP guests at the event in Cambridge.

The St Margaret Ward Way aims to inspire students to become good people at their core, and it is a delight to see these students fully embrace this philosophy. In the First Tech Challenge, VNATION have shown that they are not just excellent students, but exceptional members of their community overall.

HOW ST JOSEPH'S CATHOLIC ACADEMY USE SPORT TO ENGAGE WITH THEIR COMMUNITY

The schools in North Stoke Excel Academy SGO area have really embraced the School Games Mark award since it first started. From one application in 2011-12, to 46 in 2018-19 out of a total of 54 schools.

St Joseph's Catholic Academy have been a beacon of good practice since they first applied, aiming for a Silver in the year after the award launched. Their plan was to put together a solid application with an aim to see where they needed to make progress towards Gold. Since their first Gold, they have aimed to maintain and develop those high standards and achieved Platinum in 2019.

The tiered structure of the criteria has been really helpful on their journey. At the start it gave them targets to aim for and provided a pathway to develop their provision to meet Gold. As new questions were added, they used the guidance to ensure their Gold level offer was maintained each year and resulted in a successful Platinum application.

The school recognise how important the PE and Sport Premium funding has been in their development, turning PE into the most heavily funded subject in the school. This funding has been used to ensure the students can access a wide range of opportunities and also ensure that there is a residual benefit to the school. The funding allows the school, as part of a local network of schools, to employ specialist staff to come in once a week to do CPD with their staff which means there is a year-round approach to training. At the start of each year the school conduct a PE skills audit to identify training gaps, and then plan out their CPD requirements for the year based on this information.

The specialists lead the CPD, assist with team teaching, and help to develop high standards with demonstrations / observations / assessments etc. and it has really benefitted the whole staff. There is a much stronger delivery for PE

across the whole school, and wider options for extra-curricular activities. Staff from Port Vale Foundation also come in and do additional CPD. The school make sure they target and use their funding wisely!

Although the school understand that their School Games activity is not the key to solve all the issues they face, there are strong examples of how PE and school sport has had a positive impact across the school community. For some parents over the last 10 years, their only involvement in their child's school life is through sport. For some others, their first involvement with the school was through sport, such is the importance placed on it. The school have found that sport can break down some of the barriers between school and home. Once parents come into school fora sporting event, many become more comfortable in building relationships with the staff. Once those relationships start, it has really helped staff to signpost parents to other aspects of school such as reading at home etc. The staff have used sport to create, improve and maintain stronger parentschool relationships through sport.

The school promote their sport/PE activity on social media which is really popular with parents, and the school try to involve families as much as possible in school life, with sport and PE a great way to engage local families. Parents and carers can come in and participate in events alongside the children, particularly the fitness and fun based events. The school ran an 'active family' event with the specialist PE staff running it, and they invited families to come into school and be part of it. It is about teaching families about activities and games they can play at home, to provide information on food, and nutrition e.g. what is a healthy lunchbox.

Local clubs have been great too, and the school has developed lots of new relationships with local clubs over the last few years. For example, Sandyford Cricket Club came into school to help

in the lead up to the Inter-School competition, and young people from the school are now going to their club to play. It has been really good to see those active club links working again, as reestablishing links with local clubs has been one of the main challenges the school faced in 2021-22. They found some links had broken or became disjointed as some clubs folded / changed personnel, and it is great they are re-emerging. The school also facilitate some local clubs on-site, e.g. table tennis and tennis, as the school has facilities they can use.



ST PETER'S CATHOLIC ACADEMY JUDGED OUTSTANDING!

In March 2023 St Peter's Catholic Academy welcomed two inspectors from the diocese who carried out the Catholic School Inspection. The school was judged Outstanding, in all 3 areas inspected.

Inspectors stated that:

The academy's high-impact mission, 'Together, one family, one community in Christ', is universally understood, cherished, and lived out by the entire community. Consequently, all pupils speak about how they are creations of God, deserving of equal treatment and love.

This sincere belief results in pupils who are exceptionally happy and confident. Because of a prevalent, joyous culture of welcome that embraces this diverse community, pupils show the deepest levels of respect towards one another, speaking of 'differences that don't matter'. The subsequent behaviour of pupils is excellent. God's word is the heartbeat of life at St Peter's. Because of its prominence, pupils are confident in discussing what they learn from Jesus in the Gospels. They aspire to be like Him and emulate His values in their own lives. They especially relish the many opportunities to enact their responsibility to live out the principles of Catholic Social Teaching, for example, by

contributing to the parish foodbank, donating clothes to a local clothing bank, and installing recycling points around the site. Pupils clearly articulate the theology that underpins their actions in assemblies they lead - St Peter's is a vibrant and inclusive culture of welcome extends to families, parishioners, and the wider community.

Governors and leaders clearly articulate the Church's educational mission passionately and zealously. It is fundamental to their work and fuels every aspect; they inspire and energise everybody.

ST WILFRID'S CELEBRATE THEIR RECENT OFSTED JUDGEMENT

April 2023 St Wilfrid's received their much awaited OFSTED call.

Everyone in the school community were thrilled with the comments in the final report, where the inspector reported his findings from his two day visit to the school.

"Pupils are proud of their school. They know and understand the school's rules of respect for God respect for self, respect for others and respect for property." One pupil commented, 'They cover everything.'

"Parents and carers are positive about the school". One parent's comment was typical of many when they said their children 'always come home excited, wanting to tell me about their learning'.

The inspector recognised the hard work and changes made in reading and reported, "Reading is a high priority across the school. Books are central to the curriculum. This starts in early years, where there is a clear focus on children's learning of language communication. Staff read to children regularly and explore a range of vocabulary. Staff have enhanced their expertise in early reading".

Children are extremely excited and proud of their new library and already this is showing in their thirst for reading a variety of high quality text. Personal Development was highlighted as a strength of the school where the inspector commented,

Pupils value the opportunity to take on responsibilities, which develops their understanding of being responsible citizens who contribute to society. These include opportunities to be members of the school council, eco council and Catholic life leaders. They also take part in local litter-picking and have met with a local councillor regarding improvements at a local park. As a result, pupils believe they have an important role to play, saying, 'We are making our school a better place.'

The whole school community are proud of the outcome of this rigorous inspection and leaders are committed and looking forward to journeying on to the next grade in the inspection framework ensuring all children continue to benefit from exceptionally high standards of education.



ST. JOHN THE EVANGELIST MOVE INTO THEIR NEW SCHOOL BUILDING!

This term St. John the Evangelist has relocated to a stunning, purpose-built school.

Previously the school was split across two sites, 20 minutes' walk apart. The Early Years and Key Stage One pupils previously attended The Avenue based school and Key Stage Two were at the newer Gloucester Road site giving a sense of two separate schools, rather than one. Leaving behind the older, run down site on The Avenue, St John the Evangelist Catholic Academy's cohort have unified at The Gloucester Road location, creating a sense of unity throughout the school.

The pupils have an abundance of new amenities to enjoy, ultimately enhancing their educational experience. The pupils are enjoying the big brand new classrooms, a huge new school hall, amazing views in every direction (overlooking Mow Cop Castle and Jodrell Bank) and an abundance of outdoor space!

Within the building, every classroom has been fitted out with brand new furniture, resources and interactive screens as well as their own accessible toilet blocks.

Pupils can now enjoy lunchtimes together thanks to the new cooking kitchen and huge hall space, which is a vast improvement. Previously, meals were cooked at another school and brought to them, as they didn't have the space. By having their own working kitchen they're able to cook fresh meals on site.

The school is enjoying whole school assemblies and Masses for the first time as the whole school fits comfortably in the large new hall. The size of the hall means parents and parishioners are now invited to school events such as weekly celebration assemblies, class led assemblies, Mass and performances.

They have also held Key Stage tea parties for children and their families to celebrate the King's



Coronation and the PTFA have already held their first school discos.

As part of the new build, trees were planted, complementing the natural beauty of the location. The original steps from the prayer garden have also been preserved while the plants and trees have been redistributed around the school.

The children are making full use of the large playground and the field in all of the sunny weather! Year 6 have also enjoyed a Viking experience day (foraging for their own food and cooking it on fires) in the woodland area.

Combining the two sites enables siblings and relatives to see each other throughout the day and helps parents with drop off and pickups. It's great for the Key Stage Two pupils who can now develop their leadership skills and spend time with the younger children.

This is a very exciting time for St. John's, delivering exceptional education in a more fitting setting. Creating a sense of togetherness as they are finally working as one school together on one site.









ST GEORGE & ST MARTIN ECO CLUB

At the beginning of the year and to support their Live Simply action plan, St George & St Martin formed an Eco Club. This was opened up to all children in Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2. The Eco Club meet once a week after school and the club has grown in numbers, going from 15 to 30 over the year. Many of the children have been a part of Eco Club for the whole year and show a real commitment to improving the environment; they take their role very seriously.

The Eco Club has been responsible for many eco-friendly projects this year including ensuring all classes are saving energy and recycling; developing homes and feeding the wildlife in the school; brightening up the school grounds with plant pots; and developing their prayer garden.

In developing the prayer garden, the Eco Club worked on gardening activities to enhance its appearance. They focused on weeding and planting various types of plants to create an appealing and serene atmosphere. They have created an area to sit and reflect and a 'wishing well' where prayers can be left.

A statue of the Virgin Mary was an important addition to the prayer garden. It serves as a focal point for prayer and devotion; the school often ask Mary to intercede, particularly when they pray for those in their community who have been unwell.

Eco Club understands that plastic takes up to 500 years to decompose and so collected bottle tops with the idea of making a piece of artwork. They thought that making a cross would fit in to the prayer garden and would be a reminder of Jesus' sacrifice of dying on the cross. Reusing bottle tops is a great way to reduce waste going to landfill and provides a colourful addition to their prayer garden.

Father Adrian blessed the prayer garden as part of a procession and so it is a space that they are hoping all families will use. It offers a tranquil space for prayer, contemplation, and an appreciation of nature.

The Eco Club will continue to work to improve

their environment as part of the Catholic Social Teaching Principle, Caring for God's Creation, and following the teaching of Pope Francis in Laudato Si'. In Laudato Si', Pope Francis stresses the importance of taking care of our Common Home for the benefit of all. God entrusted the earth to us; an earth full of beauty and wonder and we are not always doing all we can to protect our beautiful planet.
