

Bronze and Silver Duke of Edinburgh Awards

Expedition training sessions have taken place. There were lots of sessions held in school including what expedition kit to bring, cooking and eating when camping, pitching tents and very importantly map reading and navigation. Those doing the Bronze Award have completed two practice days around Deep Hayes Country Park and Greenway Country Park. This prepared them for their remotely supervised 2-day expedition in the Roaches area on the 11th and 12th of June.

The group started at Tittesworth Reservoir where they were split into teams to walk to Gradbach Campsite following a route that the teams had planned and prepared. As this was their qualifying expedition the teams had to be self-sufficient and independent, carrying everything they needed for the two days. At the campsite they put up their tents, cooked a hot meal and camped there for the night.

On the Sunday morning they walked back to Tittesworth in their teams along a route that included a steep climb up onto the Roaches. All participants successfully completed the twenty conditions required and our assessor was very pleased with their performance all weekend.

Silver Award participants have completed their training sessions in school and three days of training walks and overnight camping in the area of the Roaches. They are now busy preparing for their Qualifying Expedition around the Dovedale and Manifold Valley area.

'It was a one-time experience many people don't get to do'


'It was overall a good experience and the sights were amazing, plus the staff were super friendly.'



Careers: Y10 Oxford University Residential Trip

In March this year, twenty Year 10 students were chosen to take part in the High Achieving Students Programme which is being collaboratively delivered by City of Stoke-on-Trent Sixth Form College, Higher Horizons and Somerville College, Oxford University.

The programme has been designed to give students an exciting experience of possible progression routes through FE and HE, as well as lots of information, advice, and guidance.

The programme was officially launched on Wednesday 30th March 2022 at City of Stoke-on-Trent Sixth Form College, with the chosen group of Year 10s then taking part in a residential at Somerville College, Oxford University in early April, before returning to weekly workshops at City of Stoke on Trent Sixth Form in May. We were joined by two other local schools for the project, Thistley Hough and St Peter's, so it was a great opportunity for the Year 10s to mix with other local Year 10 students from across the city.

During the residential trip, students stayed in halls of residence at Somerville College, Oxford University, accompanied by their teachers and student ambassadors throughout, to experience university life at a university.

Students were able to access taster lectures with Oxford University staff in many different subjects including Science, English, History and Chemistry; with information, advice, and guidance sessions; social activities, and opportunities to get to know the city, we toured the different colleges in Oxford and enjoyed a sight-seeing tour of the beautiful city as well as attending workshops and tours in the Museum.

The entire trip was funded by our Careers partnership with Higher Horizons which aims to inspire students to see different opportunities that they could opt for within their future career paths.

The project culminated in a celebration event at the City of Stoke Sixth Form College with a presentation of certificates and celebration of students' achievements. It was an amazing opportunity and the Year 10 students were an absolute credit to the school and to their parents, they fully immersed themselves in all areas of the workshops and really enjoyed the experience, it was a fantastic project and the Year 10s would definitely recommend it to future Year 10 students! Careers: Y9 Astrophysics Day at Keele University

On the 24th May thirty Y9 students enjoyed the opportunity to take part in an Astrophysics Taster Day at Keele University. The students were really excited to explore the new Stardome facility and hear all about the activities that take place on the Astrophysics courses at Keele.

The day involved workshops and tutorials where students immersed themselves in the life of an Astrophysics student at Keele University. Students enjoyed a visit to the Keele Observatory for an Astrophysics session and a visit to the Central Science Labs to see what it's like to study Geology in Space.

Year 9s also spent time learning about space in our Stardome planetarium, hearing all about how to get into HE and study these subjects and taking a tour of the University campus and meeting current students.

The total cost of the trip was entirely covered by our career's partnership with Keele University Higher Horizons scheme, all travel and workshops were included free of charge. We are really pleased to partner with Higher Horizons and hope that this leads to many more Careers trips in the future. Careers: Y8 Careers Employer Encounter Day

On Friday 10th June the whole of Year 8 celebrated their first Careers Employer Encounter Day, where they were off timetable all day to work with visiting companies to develop the basic employability skills of organisation, communication, team building and listening skills, skills that are needed for any future job role. We welcomed staff from local companies; Achieve Training, Natwest, Balfour Beatty and Staffordshire University to lead practical workshops for the Y8s where students worked as teams to develop their employability skills. The Y8s thoroughly enjoyed the experience and enjoyed meeting the visiting employers. Students also participated in a Unifrog activity during the day. Unifrog is a Careers platform that we use in school to record Careers activities for students. Students can access it from home with their login and search for information on local and national jobs, college courses and university courses and use the information to inform their future decisions. The visitors were really pleased with how the Year 8s managed the day and were impressed with the skills that they had to offer.



Y12 and Y13 BTEC Performing Arts and Dance students Fundamental British Values Tour

As part of their BTEC Performing Arts course our Year 12 and Year 13 BTEC Performing Arts and Dance students have been on tour to the Primary schools! They have created a Theatre in Education performance piece for primary school aged students, based on the fundamental British Values of Democracy, Respect and Tolerance, Rule of Law and Individual Liberty. This can be quite a challenging topic to teach to primary school aged students so through their performance piece they have included ways to teach the values, helping the students to remember them and even quizzing them at the end of the performance. The tour has been a great success, the primary students have benefited greatly from the experience and it has helped to embed the knowledge being delivered by the primary schools. Staff were really impressed with the students' confidence in their performance and their ability to lead the primary school students for a workshop after the performance. The piece included the 'Respect Rap' which taught students lyrics about how to respect their peers and others around them.

Y10 & Y12 Staffordshire University Great Minds Bus Tour

At St Margaret Ward we celebrate Careers Week each term, as part of our Careers Week term 3 celebrations, we have welcomed Staffordshire University's Great Minds Bus Tour to our school site. On Monday 4th July over 170 students in Year 12 and Year 10 have had the opportunity to visit the bus to gather information about the courses and subjects that Staffordshire University offer, the difference between undergraduate, postgraduate, masters and PHD courses, a talk about student finance, a chance to meet student ambassadors and engage in a Q&A about student life at University - including the types of clubs and societies that they offer, as well as a chance to take a virtual tour of the Staffs Uni campus! The students absolutely loved the experience and enjoyed the opportunity to meet with the student ambassadors, it really opened their eyes to what university life could be like!



6th Form University visit

At the Keele Problem Solving day on 4th July, we had three sessions throughout the day involving different aspects of problem solving.

For the first session, we were given a sheet double sided with Maths problems and tried to solve them. It involved our knowledge of the circle equations and finding the equations of straight lines. An example question was a rhombus on a graph and we had to work out the equations for each side of the rhombus using the information of the graph provided.

For the second session, we learnt about Fermi and had to solve Fermi questions. For example, we had to estimate how many bricks would make a semi-detached three-bedroom house. This was very interesting as it used our Mathematical skills, but applying them to a new scenario we had not seen before. The last session involved solving a variety of challenging mathematical problems and this was an engaging tasks as there was a wide range of different skills required, making it a very enjoyable day!

"Visiting Cambridge was an amazing experience. The standard of education, the quality of teaching and the atmosphere far superseded our expectations. The information given at different stalls during the day was very detailed and gave us lots of insight as to how life in Cambridge is for students in STEM as well as for prospective humanities students. It was really useful being able to explore the campuses and courses, whilst being able to somewhat experience what student life may be like. We experienced tours from students who attend the university and had great opportunities to ask them about their subjects, how to join and apply and what the course is made up of.

The students helped to explain the housing and colleges and how it all works so that we understood if we were intending on applying. We were able to explore the buildings following our guide and they explained what rooms you do certain things in and what years you use certain equipment. We were able to split up and go to the buildings that we were interested in so that we could make the most of our time and learn the information that we needed. Being able to speak to the specific teachers helped us to get the greatest insight into their subjects and made the prospect of applying seem easier. It was a really interesting day with a great opportunity to see what university life is like at Cambridge!"

London Trip Friday 15th

On Friday 15th 30 Year 12 students (History, Politics and Sociology) spent the day in London. In the morning we visited the world-famous Camden Market before travelling to Tower Bridge where we took a river tour from Tower Bridge to Westminster. We then completed a full guided tour of both Houses of Parliament, this included entering both chambers of the House. Afterwards we walked through Whitehall, passed Downing Street and then walk to Covent Garden via Piccadilly. This trip is often the first time many of our students have been to the capital. We have a real habit of bumping into famous people, in 2019 we saw Sylvester Stallone being chauffeured in a Rolls Royce and in 2017 we saw Simon Pegg and Nick Frost at a red-carpet event in Piccadilly. The whole day is an adventure rich in cultural capital and one our students remember for ever.

This ranged from the 2021 Nobel Prize winners, who developed a physical model of the Earth's climate, quantifying variability and reliability predicting global warming to the work of a group of Physicists and Biologists working collaboratively to restore speech in a paralysed man by using brain waves and turning them into words on a computer.

After 3 hours the balloon had sailed back down to earth using a parachute and had landed in a farmer's field in Sudbury just south of Ashbourne. They met a lovely farmer that allowed the school access to his land and also pointed them in the right direction. It wasn't long before they spotted the florescent orange parachute in the distance and the capsule was retrieved fully intact.

The students had an amazing day along with Mr Fryer, Mr Foster and Stephen Christey from Hobb Computer Services Ltd whose local company kindly sponsored the team. The next step for the students is to analyse the data from the experiment and to examine the amazing video footage that was captured.




Year 10

Throughout this term, Year 10 students have been focusing on revision skills and looking at methods which will support them in improving the quality of their independent revision, and in turn their performance in assessments. During Fidei time, students have taken part in sessions in which they have been taught about six research-based learning strategies. These six strategies are dual coding, elaboration, concrete examples, interleaving, retrieval practice and spaced practice. We believe, that by equipping the students with the skills that they will have gained during these sessions, they will be able to make effective use of their independent revision time.

As part of the focus on revision, parents and carers were invited into the Academy to join Mrs Poole and Mrs Salt in a revision workshop. The workshop was designed to help equip parents and carers with the knowledge and skills to be able to support their children in their revision. During the workshop, parents and carers undertook some practical examples of revision tasks that the students can utilise at home.

The support of parents and carers in the revision process is vital in ensuring maximum success for the students and we would like to thank those who have taken part in the sessions so far and look forward to seeing many more of you at the workshops in the new academic year.



Our Trip to the Peace Conference

On Tuesday 12th July, we attended the Peace Conference organised by Borderlines at the New Vic theatre in Newcastle. This conference was being held to remember the victims of the Bosnian Genocide, to explore the impact of the atrocity and to consider the role and importance of peace in a world that continues to face such devastation. The theme of the day was 'seeds of peace'; a motto used by victims of the genocide who do not view the past with anger but work for a future of peace and justice.

The conference started with a performance of 'My Thousand-Year-Old Land' which displayed the experience of Bosnian women in Sarajevo during the Bosnian war and after the fighting had stopped. The Bosnian war took place between 1992 and 1995 which led to the persecution and genocide of Muslims, particularly men and boys. By focusing on the women, in an all-female cast, the play was able to show the lasting impact on the Bosnian women as a result of the death of their male relatives. The cast contained descendants of Bosnian survivors and victims. They told us their stories using personal accounts and shared their experiences of the war and genocide. It was an emotional performance that makes you sympathise with the survivors and their journey as they lost their homes and loved ones through discrimination, persecution and injustice.

During the afternoon we had the opportunity to take part in workshops where we learnt about the war in even more detail and where we were given the chance to speak to the survivors, descendants of victims and members of the criminal investigation team who led the war crime trials after the war had ended.

They described the significance of identifying individuals using science and technology as well as explaining the humanitarian aspect of bringing closure to families who were and still are looking for their missing loved ones. Despite their suffering these women and mothers do not feel hate towards those who brought injustice to their families and community. In the final workshop, we were given the opportunity to write letters to the 'mothers of Sarajevo' who live together in a small community. They are still searching for their loved ones and live together as a sign of solidarity, unity and peace.

This trip has been an eye opener as we discovered so much about a war most don't know much about. People have endured so much suffering and pain; it was so inspirational to listen to their stories and their strength and bravery towards overcoming the horrors they endured first hand. We will never forget the experience we had today and we will always remember the victims of genocide.
